Parish Profile April 2024



Grace-Calvary Episcopal Church was established in 1838 as Grace Protestant Episcopal Church. It was the sixth Episcopal parish to be established in Georgia. The church building, completed in 1842, remains the oldest unaltered Episcopal church building in the state. Built by Jarvis Van Buren, a relative of U.S. President Martin Van Buren, and consecrated on Oct. 10th, 1842, the church is a superb example of Greek Revival Architecture characterized by tall columns and a portico. The historic structure continues to serve its parish as it did when it was consecrated. Extensive restoration was done in the mid-1950s and in the 1980s, and current members place great importance on keeping the historic structure in good condition. The name was changed to Grace-Calvary in 1974 when it merged with Calvary Episcopal Church in Cornelia.

Our Goals

The people of Grace-Calvary have initiated the process of searching for a new Rector with open and willing hearts. During the interim, we accepted eagerly the Leadership of clergy who lovingly cared for us and our Vestry has attended to the business of running the Church. The Vestry, responding to data from the survey for the Parish Profile, has established the following goals for Grace-Calvary:

- Increase the membership of Grace-Calvary Episcopal Church, with emphasis on young families.
- Strengthen Christian Formation and other programs for children and youth.
- Enhance the spiritual health of Grace-Calvary through strong lay programs of pastoral care.
- Strengthen the Grace-Calvary community through open communications and responsive leadership.

Work on achieving these goals has begun in earnest. New committees have been appointed to address newcomers' needs, communication, and lay pastoral care. While goal attainment is ongoing, we have made a good beginning and look forward to welcoming a new Rector who will join us in reaching these and other objectives.

Grace-Calvary is a strong congregation with committed members, dedicated leadership, and is poised for the opportunities change will bring.

We are surrounded by the beauty of the North Georgia Mountains and are blessed with a welcoming and warm congregation.

We are committed to maintaining a visible presence in a growing community, and embracing the unique position of the Episcopal Church in the world.

Our historic and intimate church building attracts both newcomers and locals.

Our beautiful campus serves as a cornerstone for many local outreach programs for which we have a longstanding commitment.

Attracting young people and families with children is a challenge that Grace-Calvary shares with many churches today.

We recognize the importance of listening to the needs of our parish and community in order to develop activities to engage more involvement and participation.

How We Grow in Our Faith

Christian Formation

Grace-Calvary's rich heritage of Christian formation inspires and instills confidence in the future as we rebuild our programs in the wake of the pandemic.

Our small parish has produced a remarkable number of youth leaders at the Diocesan level in recent decades. We aim for that tradition to continue!

Currently we have two teenage parishioners who recently represented Grace-Calvary at the Diocesan Youth Council 2022 event at Camp Mikell. We hope to reestablish a youth group on our campus as we attract additional teens.

Our Sunday School program is designed to accommodate ages 5 - 13, discussing "The Sunday Paper" and "The Sunday Paper Junior" lectionary-based curriculum in small groups.

Adults are nurtured and stimulated in a weekly "Adult Forum" class where lively discussions ensue around engaging books chosen by forum participants. Another class meets to view and discuss the series, "The Chosen."

Grace-Calvary has traditionally sponsored the Sewanee-based Education for Ministry program, which will continue in years to come as we fully recover from the pandemic shutdown.

Our comfortable facilities and committed volunteers provide fertile soil for the exploration of God's word together.

We look forward to enriching past traditions while we remain excited about new and different ways to learn from God and from one another.

Worship

Grace-Calvary's historic significance is a defining feature of the church and one which endears parishioners and others to it. Built in 1842, this simple space provides a sacred atmosphere for our worship.

While we have adopted some variations, we adhere strongly to the liturgical calendar, observing each season with traditional services.

Laity participate in worship in several ways.
Chalice bearers, lectors, and crucifers
contribute regularly. The Altar Guild, Flower
Guild, and Bread Guild serve faithfully behind
the scenes to ensure that all aspects of the
worship experience are in place and ready.

Music is an essential component of worship at Grace-Calvary. It is enhanced by the church's historic Erben organ. Commissioned in 1848, it is the oldest working pipe organ in Georgia and is continues to be played weekly during worship. The church is privileged to have a vocal choir and a bell choir. Both rehearse weekly and perform regularly in worship.

St. Julian Hall

Named for St. Julian Lachicotte, priest at Grace -Calvary from 1981-1990, St. Julian Hall has Sunday School classrooms for children and adults, a nursery, large commercial-grade kitchen, library, and a spacious meeting area upstairs. A porch at the end of St. Julian Hall provides a "stage" for outdoor fellowship events. The playground adjacent to the Hall is a fun, safe place for the children. In 2019, the basement was renovated to better serve the numerous outreach programs hosted here.

Parish Office

During the tenure of Julian Lachicotte, a house across the street from the church was purchased and converted into offices. The building has separate offices for the rector, office manager, financial administrator, and the office volunteer. In addition, the building has a full kitchen, a small sitting area, a large multi-purpose room, and a large conference room. This building is regularly used by various community outreach groups and an adult Christian Formation class.

Labyrinth of the Holy Cross

On the grounds of St. Julian Hall, the Labyrinth of the Holy Cross is welcoming and waiting for seekers to wander its path. The labyrinth, designed by local artist David Wall, was installed in 2010. A hand-crafted metal and stained glass Celtic cross sits atop a stone memorial in the center of the labyrinth. The labyrinth has hosted outdoor worship services and is open to the community as well. Many travel the path of the labyrinth as a form of meditation and prayer.

Our Faith in Action

Reaching Out

Outreach

In accordance with our Mission statement, we seek ways to minister to one another and to reach out to others.

The church was instrumental in beginning several local outreach programs which have grown over the years to provide needed services for county residents. Examples include the Soup Kitchen, Sharing & Caring (a thrift shop and financial assistance ministry), and the Foothills Counseling Center.

The church also provides regular welcoming meeting spaces for many local groups not otherwise associated with the church, such as AA and Al Anon meetings, Foothills Counseling, Local Farmer's Market and Red Cross Blood Drives.

Grace-Calvary members engage with the community generously with donations of time, talent, and materials across a wide spectrum of need. Examples include building ramps for the disabled, volunteering at the soup kitchens, Habitat for Humanity builds, collecting supplies for the soup kitchens and our local animal shelter, Prison Ministry, Christmas caroling to shut-ins, and partnering with a local elementary school to provide Christmas for children of families in need.

Song of the Chattahoochee

While Habersham County is noted in the *Song* of the Chattahoochee, Clarkesville is known for a tributary of the Chattahoochee River - - the Soque River. The Soque River surrounds Clarkesville on the west and southwest sides of the city, and the river is known for its scenic beauty and trophy trout fishing. Clarkesville is the county seat of Habersham County, and is a small 2.49 square mile area with a 2020 Census population of 1,900. Since its founding in 1823, Clarkesville has been known as a tourist destination. Tourism and second homes are still important factors in the community.

The per capita income of Habersham County is \$29,069 (2022) and the median household income is \$56,680 (2021). In the 1990s, Rand McNally named Clarkesville the second best place to retire in the United States. With it's rural setting in the beautiful foothills of the Appalachian mountains, essential amenities, small town friendliness, and affordable living, Habersham County is a desirable location for people of all ages.

Higher Education

Area residents are fortunate to have access to a variety of opportunities for advanced education. North Georgia Technical College is located in Clarkesville. Piedmont University is 4 miles south in Demorest. To the west is Truett -McConnell University and to the east, Toccoa Falls College. Brenau University is south of Clarkesville in Gainesville.

The Arts

Piedmont University has an outstanding venue for its performing arts program, The Swanson Center. In downtown Clarkesville, the Habersham Community Theatre showcases local talent and their productions are quite often performed to sold out audiences.

Outdoor Opportunities

In addition to the Soque River, other outdoor recreation areas nearby include Lake Russell and Nancytown Lake, Tallulah Gorge State Park, Smithgall Woods State Park, Lake Burton, Lake Seed, and Lake Rabun. There are numerous camping, hunting, boating, and hiking opportunities in the surrounding Chattahoochee National Forest.

The county rec sports program is based at The Ruby Fulbright Aquatic Center in Clarkesville. Youth and adult sports leagues as well as individual activities, such as pickleball, tennis and swimming, are offered.

Easy to Travel To and From

Clarkesville is conveniently located close to two international airports, 85 miles from Hartsfield-Jackson in Atlanta and 77 miles from Greenville-Spartanburg International Airport. For those who may prefer rail travel, there is an Amtrak station in Toccoa, 11 miles east of Clarkesville.

Rector Search

The people of Grace-Calvary are eager for the leadership of a new Rector. We have been challenged to focus on who we are as a Christian community. This process called for and produced strong lay leadership. At the same time, while we have been served by a multiplicity of supply and interim priests, we need the stability and guidance that only a full time Rector can provide. We do not expect a Rector to single-handedly address our challenges. Rather, we look forward to a strong, effective partnership where each party is called to bring forth and use those gifts which reflect God's will for Grace-Calvary.

Strong, meaningful preaching: the ability to communicate a comprehensive understanding of the Bible and Christian theology and make it relevant to people's lives.


Spiritual Leadership: leading the congregation into a deeper understanding of our relationship with Christ.
